FAST AND ABSTINENCE

Those who have reached their fourteenth year are bound to abstain entirely from meat on Ash Wednesday and all the Fridays of Lent.

All Catholics between the ages of eighteen and fifty-nine are also bound to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. This means to limit oneself to a single full meal and avoiding food between meals. Two other light meals, which together do not equal a full meal, may be taken during the day.

EUCCHARISTIC ADORATION

Every Thursday from 1:00 to 8:00 PM in the Chapel off the south side of the Church. Benediction is celebrated at 7:45 PM. Come spend some time in prayer before our Lord in the Blessed Sacrament.

SACRAMENT OF PENANCE

Lent is a special time to celebrate the Sacrament of Penance. Priests are available for confessions each Saturday afternoon from 4:00 to 4:45 PM.

We're not in Kansas anymore!

A reflection on Lent at St. Mary's

One of my favorite films as a child was *The Wizard of Oz*. I still try to watch it whenever it comes on. The one scene that always sticks in my mind is when Dorothy's house lands in Oz after being carried away in the tornado. The entire opening of the film is in black and white, but when she opens the door and sees the beauty and colors of Oz she exclaims to Toto, "We're not in Kansas anymore!" She knew things were different immediately because the world look different. It's the same with Lent. I recall a story told to me by a Director of Religious Education who had prepared some wonderful pre-Lenten celebrations for the children of her parish. On the night before Ash Wednesday, they held a prayer service in church. Following the service, while the parish environment committee was cleaning out the church for Lent, she had the children gather in the church basement for a Mardi Gras celebration and then outside to burn palms from the previous year to be used the following day as ashes. After the party, she quietly processed the children back into the church to pray. One of the little boys took one look at the darkened church, now cleared of flowers and other decorations, and proclaimed, "*I guess the party's over.*" This kid "got it!" He noticed the difference in the church and realized that now they were entering into a new season. Just as Dorothy's house landed in a different place, we are now in a different place, symbolically speaking. Things look different because they are different. Unlike Oz that was full of color and brightness, Lent stands out as somber, penitential and reflective, sparse and perhaps a bit like the black and white scenes from the film.

Lent takes on a different "flavor" liturgically. One of the first things people notice is the lack of decoration. According to Church tradition, we do not display flowers during Lent and any other environmental touches are subdued. The color for Lent is purple, which is the color of repentance. We omit the Gloria and we put "Alleluia" to rest until Easter. Our music is not as joyful, and the prayers and readings of the Mass help us to reflect on turning away from sin and reconciling ourselves to God.

Here at St. Mary's you will notice some changes to reflect the season. Aside from the absence of the Gloria and Alleluia, we will be praying the Confiteor (*I Confess*) at all Sunday Masses followed by the chanting of *Kýrie, eléison, Christe, eléison, Kýrie, eleison*, which is, **Lord, have mercy, Christ, have mercy, Lord, have mercy**. Despite what some people think, this is not Latin but Greek, and the only remaining Greek used in the Latin Rite liturgy. We will also be chanting the **Agnus Dei** in place of the English **Lamb of God**. The words are: *Agnus Dei, qui tollis peccáta mundi: miserére nobis. Agnus Dei, qui tollis pecáta mundi: miserére nobis, Agnus Dei, qui tollis pecáta mundi: dona nobis pacem*. After this chant we all kneel as we normally do following the **Lamb of God**.

Musically, we will begin each Sunday Mass with the same song during the whole of Lent, *Save Your People O Lord*, to remind us that we need Christ as our Lord and Savior, and to help us admit to ourselves that "*we have been wandering far from (His) love.*" The Ordinary chants of the Mass, the acclamations and responses, will also change to reflect the penitential character of the season.

One of the things we can do as members of the worshipping assembly is to be aware of our own postures during the Mass, the way we pray, the way we process to receive communion, the way we act when we are in the presence of the Blessed Sacrament in the tabernacle. Do we make a sign of reverence to our Lord by a making a genuflection or profound bow as we enter the church or pass the tabernacle? Do we remain quiet, both before and after Mass, so that others can pray undisturbed? Do we make sure our cell phones are turned off?

Yes, things are certainly different in the church during Lent. But Lent is not just about changes in the church. The real question is, how will I be different? What changes need to be made in my life during this season?

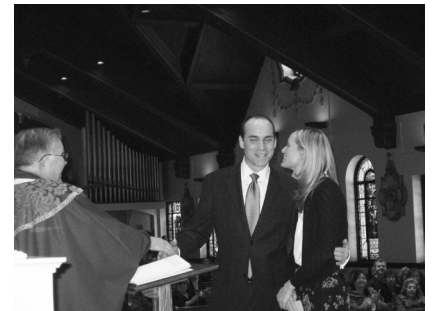
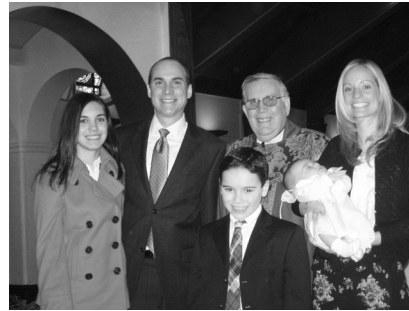
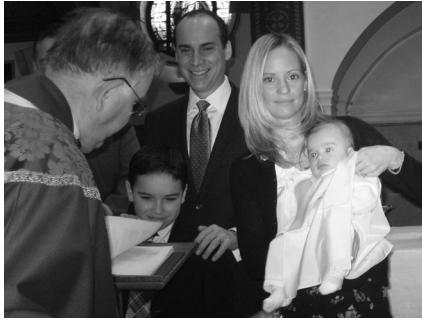
This week's question: Today our catechumens are going to the Rite of Election at St. Agnes Cathedral. What is the Rite of Election and what happens at it?

Answer to last week's question: What is the significance of the Mardi Gras celebration? It seems as if it is something the Church would disapprove of. Despite the overindulgence, drunkenness and seemingly un-Christian behaviors that accompany many modern Mardi Gras celebrations, the origin of Mardi Gras has very Christian roots. Traditionally, it is the last day before the fasting season of Lent. It is the French name for Shrove Tuesday. Literally translated, the term means "Fat Tuesday" and was so called because it represented the last opportunity for merrymaking and excessive indulgence in food and drink before the solemn season of fasting. It was also the time to use up all the stores of those foods that people would be fasting from during Lent. Traditionally that would be sweets, fats, dairy and meat. In the cities of some Roman Catholic countries the custom of holding carnivals for Mardi Gras has continued since the Middle Ages when people also celebrated Carnivale, the period of time from Epiphany to Shrove Tuesday, with parades, costumes and dances.

Adolescent Catechesis

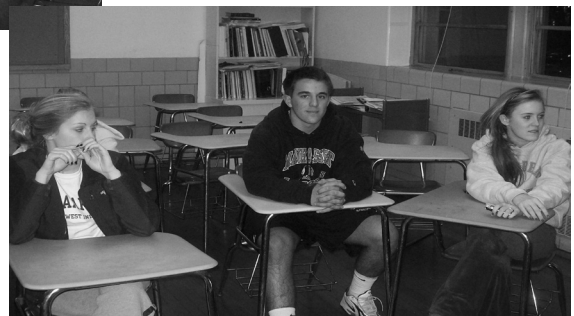
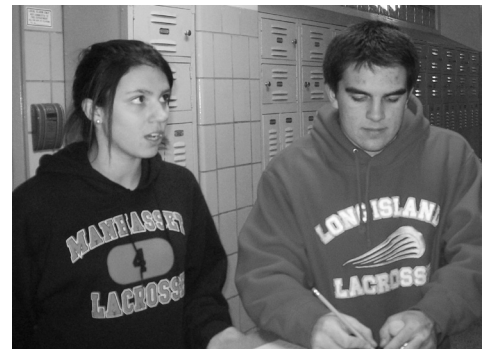
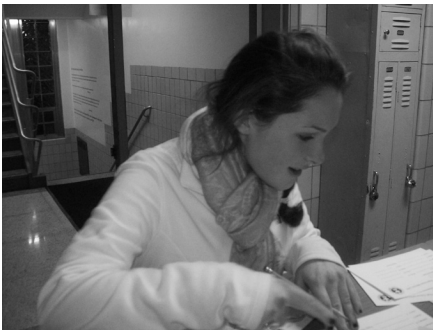
Every Monday night at 7:15 PM, our teens meet at Marist Hall for “CCD.” That’s what they call it, but I prefer the term Adolescent Catechesis. CCD stands for Confraternity of Christian Doctrine, and while our Monday night classes include church doctrine, that’s only a part of the process of catechesis.

Catechesis is a Greek word that literally means "resounding" or "echoing". The message of the Gospel and the Church’s teachings are echoed in the classrooms of Marist Hall on Monday nights in the hope of nourishing and deepening individual and communal faith. But catechesis is much more than a deliberate and systematic communication of information. It’s the story of lived faith that is absorbed through relationships. We learn from watching, from participating, from being invited into relationships that foster our cognitive, spiritual and psychological growth. We’re born to be life long learners, especially when it comes to learning about ourselves, our God, and others. While catechesis is often associated with kids, the truth is, the faith formation of children is limited because their experience of life is limited, as are their questions. Adolescence brings with it new questions, new longings and a world of things wondered about that childhood catechesis probably didn’t cover.

Childhood faith is childlike. It’s immature and dies a natural death somewhere in adolescence or young adulthood. It’s unrealistic to think that childhood faith could survive the challenges that today’s teens face from day to day. Monday night meetings provide an opportunity for the kids to talk about the issues that confront their Catholic faith. Victoria Belinsky, who attended the Monday program throughout her four years of high school, put it this way.

“We don’t always talk about the predicted topic or what the worksheets say because there’s a comfort level which allows all of us to say anything we want without hesitation. When I see the Monday night kids in school the next day, I don’t have to worry or be embarrassed about something I might have said the night before. I know that Ms. McDonough and the members of the group understood what I said and will respect me and the trust with which I shared my thoughts. Monday nights allow me to connect with my faith and really see how it plays into my everyday life. The classroom where we meet in Marist Hall, although filled with desks and chalkboards, is so much more than an ordinary classroom to me. It’s an escape from my busy, chaotic life. It’s holy ground where I can learn more about myself and others and the God we share.”

Adolescent catechesis at St. Mary’s encourages wholeness. It’s more than what teens believe or what the Church asks them to believe. It’s a discussion of how they live, how they love, pray, grow, grieve and make sense of their ever evolving universe.
